Secure zSeries Backup Volumes with SecureZIP

KZIP has long been a trusted utility for backing up datasets on all platforms, including the zSeries platform. PKZIP's compressed archives provide an ideal container for efficiently storing copies of critical data onsite or offsite.

SecureZIP protects the confidentiality of your data by adding enterprise-grade encryption to PKZIP's existing capabilities. Using X.509 V3 digital certificates and the NIST-approved, FIPS 197-certified, AES 256-bit algorithm, SecureZIP provides strong, public/private key encryption that integrates easily with your backup processing. SecureZIP also provides other security-related features, including these:

- **Contingency-key processing** to ensure that the organization can always decrypt encrypted data
- **Filename encryption** to ensure that file metadata is protected from malicious interception
- Digital signing/authentication to validate identity and guard against data tampering

SecureZIP's ability to back up critical business datasets and to store these datasets in strongly encrypted archives using the industry-accepted, crossplatform ZIP format is gaining SecureZIP an increasingly important place in the backup strategies of the zSeries data center.

Back Up Directly to Secure ZIP Secure Tape Archives

You can write as many as 65,000 individual member datasets to a SecureZIP archive, and strongly encrypt them in the process. Datasets can be grouped by application, volume grouping, and so on. To restore the datasets, you extract them from the archive.

To save space and CPU cycles, SecureZIP compresses the datasets before encrypting them. SecureZIP maintains a directory in the archive of the datasets the archive contains. SecureZIP archives can be cataloged in the MVS catalog, and the volumes can be managed using removable media managers such as DFSMSrmm or CA-1.

Back Up Specified Datasets

Here is sample JCL that can be used with SecureZIP to back up specified datasets to an archive.

Capture the Archive's File Catalog

Here is sample JCL that can be used to capture the file catalog maintained in the central directory of the ZIP archive. This information can be saved for reference.
